ICE COORDINATOR REPORT - Ashley Halloran



The ESMHA had a very successful season on the ice, with access to ice time seven days a week.

All teams from U11 and up consistently requested additional practice sessions. The U9 teams also asked for extra ice time a few times each month. Meeting these requests was sometimes challenging due to limited ice availability. Some teams expressed concerns about early morning practice slots (6:00–7:00 AM), though these times were rotated fairly among all teams. Most teams understood they would be scheduled for weekend practices, with time slots rotating on their designated day.

The U18 team held their weekly practice on Monday nights at 9:00 PM. The U7 division consisted of two teams, each receiving two hours of ice time per week.

• One of the main challenges this season was scheduling around other leagues that hosted home games on weekends. Eastern Shore teams, in particular, had most of their practice slots scheduled for Saturdays and Sundays, which often conflicted with their away games, limiting their ability to attend practices.

- The season started off with pre-season camps This was run in partnership with ESMHA coaches and MD360 (Roger Boychuck). We offered ESMHA skills sessions as well as conditioning camp for u11-u18. Quick start was offered for u9/u7. We hosted 2 goalie sessions. The camps ran over a two week period.
- We had 13 Junior Coaches this year in our Junior Coaches program. They were disbursed to teams from u7-u11. They were trained prior (in classroom) and post season recap.

Tryouts

Evaluations ran from September 29th - October 8th.

First season using Grayjay platform to run the tryouts; it went very smoothly and we will be using it again this season. Grayjay keeps player identities anonymous and automatically compiles and averages scores.

We had 10 independent evaluators participate, including those specialized in goaltenders, with a minimum of four present at each tryout session.

• This year we also implemented a goalie specific session as an evaluation. This helped provide a more in-depth look at each player and allowed for better evaluation compared to intersquad and exhibition game situations - when they may get an uneven number of shots or challenges compared to each other.

U7 COORDINATOR REPORT - Erin Beers

- U7 2024-25 Season
- Registration 88 Registered at the beginning of the season and 79 to close out the season.
- 19 4-year-olds
- 22 5-year-olds
- 38 6-year-olds
- Practices were held Saturday's and Sunday's
- Times ranging from 7am to 5pm
- 2 Groups (U7-1 6-year-olds, U7-2 4 and 5-year-olds)
- 2 1-hour ice times per week.
- · Christmas party was cancelled due to weather and not rescheduled due to scheduling conflicts. Extra funds were used at the year-end party.
- Year End Party was held at Cole Harbour Place and consisted of 1-hour private pool party and 1 and a half hours in the banquet room for food, drinks and awards/year end gifts.
- Jamborees We participated in 4 jamborees including our own at the end of the season. First jamboree was held at the end of November and was for all age groups. The second was held in January at the Scotia Bank centre, hosted my Tim Hortons Timbits hockey and was offered to the 5 and 6-year-olds. Third jamboree was family day weekend and was offered again to all age groups. Then we finished out the season with our home jamboree.
- Eastern Shore Jamboree We hosted 62 teams at this year's jamboree. 54 teams from associations across Nova Scotia, including 8 of our own teams. The jamboree was hosted over 2 days, and we had seen over 650 players come and go. We offered a fun zone in the bingo hall that included a sucker pull, popcorn and cotton candy, face painting, bouncy castle and target shouting. We also offered a hospitality suite with hot chocolate, coffee and Timbits donated by Tim Hortons and snacks for the kids.
- Moosehead Intermission Games 6-year-old players are provided the opportunity to play in the Moosehead intermission games. We are provided 3 games. 10 players per game. All players were picked by random draw and unfortunately, we had a handful of players that were not randomly selected and did not have the opportunity to play. A "7th" player is selected by random draw to go onto the ice with the Mooseheads for the singing of the National Anthem. Players are provided with 2 tickets free of charge (in the upper bowl). Any other tickets needed, are to be purchased by the family.
- Moosehead Minor Hockey Night The "Team" is offered special pricing for kids and adult tickets for certain games throughout the Moosehead Season. We attended a game in early December and were provided a section in the upper bowl to watch the game with players and family members. All kids in attendance are provided with a Moosehead toque.
- Outside Edge Power Skating this season for development we had an instructor from Outside Edge come to 2 practices for each group and run power skating drills with our players, with the help of our coaches. Troy focused on glides and the fundamentals of skating.

Challenges & Recommendations

- •Pre-season skills + balancing ran long; late team formation
- •Recommend aligning U9 team formation with U11–U18 tryout timelines
- •Explore Mariners jerseys in place of Tim Bits; managed like U11–U18
 - Included in team budgets, returned at the end of the season.
- •Extra ice opportunities were often unable to be taken due to weekend game conflicts
- •Goalie gear: Each team requires 2 sets due to the half-ice format
- 3 Bauer kits purchased these were adequate; goalie interest from players with personal gear helped top up gear for each team
- Gear must remain with teams, not shared across teams
- Recommend additional Bauer kits for U7 and a full set for the Advancing team
- •• Suggest purchasing gear bags for better team management and gear allotment early in the season

Overall: A strong season with high participation, coach engagement, and meaningful player development

Eastern Shore Minor Hockey – U13 Coordinator Report 2024-25 Submitted by Jayne Breton, U13 Coordinator

This season, Eastern Shore Minor Hockey proudly hosted three U13 teams: one U13A and two balanced U13C teams (Black and Gold). All teams operated with small rosters, which provided ample ice time but also created challenges in maintaining full lineups. Managers played a key role in coordinating affiliate players (APs), often requiring significant time and effort across divisions — their work was critical to keeping the season running smoothly.

U13A had a strong season, finishing 3rd in the regular season (TBC), placing 2nd in Central Minor Playoffs, and winning the Accord Banner. The team also competed with a small bench (1 goalie, 4 defens, 9 forwards) and was led by a non-parent coach. A scheduling discrepancy at the U13A level — fewer regular season games compared to other divisions — was noted and attributed to team numbers in Central Minor.

U13C - The two U13C teams were formed based on balanced evaluations. U13C Black won their division in the Dartmouth Recreational Hockey League and captured three banners: the Wayne Waugh Tournament, Eastern Shore Invitational Tournament, and regular season league title. U13C Gold welcomed two U11 players (one goalie, one skater) who stepped up to support the team. Across all teams, coaches prioritized skill development and sportsmanship. While there were initial concerns around tournament volunteer participation and communication, events were successful overall.

Challenges identified this season included the AP process, lack of clarity around the team manager role, and the opportunity to strengthen the relationship between team staff and the Association—valuable areas for improvement moving forward. Thank you to all coaches, managers, players, and families for your commitment and support throughout the season.



U15 COORDINATOR REPORT - Tanya Murphy

U15 Coordinator report

This season, our association was pleased to offer both U15B and U15C teams. While the initial tryout process presented some challenges—resulting in an insufficient number of players to form a complete U15B roster—we were able to successfully recruit two additional players who had not participated in tryouts. This allowed us to move forward with two full teams and provide our athletes with the opportunity to compete and develop throughout the season.

The U15B team for this past season consisted of 12 skaters and 2 goalies. Overall, it was a successful and rewarding season filled with growth, development, and memorable moments both on and off the ice.

In regular season play, the team finished 5th out of 15 teams in a competitive league — And 3rd in their pool in the provincial qualifiers, a strong showing that reflected the hard work and determination of the players and coaching staff. Additionally, we took part in 2 tournaments, one away in PEI and a local tournament event that included four teams who were not participating in SEDMHA, which offered another great opportunity for competition and development.

While the season brought many positives, it was not without its challenges. We faced some difficulties with player commitment and financial constraints related to player budgets. However, through the support of families, coaching staff, and team management, we were able to address and resolve most of these issues, allowing the team to focus on the game and enjoy the remainder of the season.

The U15C had a wonderfully successful season nearly 100% drama free! Despite challenges with scoring and winning games, nearly all of our games were closely contested, highlighting the team's consistent effort and competitive spirit. The team participated in three tournaments (two away, one home)

The team consisted of 13 skaters and 1 goalie. They welcomed three brand new players to hockey this season, including one who joined in December. Their progress and enthusiasm were a testament to both their commitment and the support of our coaching staff. Our coaches were incredibly strong leaders, continuously motivating the players and fostering growth and team spirit throughout the season.

They encountered no major issues that couldn't be managed internally. Notably, one player traveled an hour each way to attend practices and games, a remarkable show of dedication from his family. Their positive experience speaks volumes about the strength of our association.

Together the U15B and U15C benefited from a blended scrimmage practice where lots of fun and laughs were had. We were also proud to give back through a "Stuff a Stocking" initiative. Each player experienced personal growth and success thanks to the guidance and support of our exceptional coaching team.
